Back in November, Westford was awarded significant state grant funding through the Community One Stop for Growth program. These grants will support important initiatives, including improvements to pedestrian and bicycle connectivity, local transportation infrastructure, and future planning efforts. This investment represents a meaningful boost for our community and will help us continue to enhance the quality of life for residents.

The Westford Police Department is once again spreading holiday cheer through its annual Toys for Tots collection. Residents are invited to donate new, unwrapped toys now through Wednesday, December 10. Donations may be dropped off in the lobby of the Police Department at 53 Main Street.

We would like to remind all residents that the Town's Winter Parking Ban is in effect from November 1 through March 31. During this period, no on-street parking is permitted for more than one hour between 1 a.m. and 6 a.m. In addition, vehicles may not be parked on the street during snowstorms or while post-storm cleanup operations are underway. Violations of the Winter Parking Ban may result in a \$25 fine, and vehicles may be towed. We appreciate everyone's cooperation in helping to keep our roads safe and clear throughout the winter season.

On Tuesday, December 9, I will be presenting the FY27 Budget Presentation to the Select Board at their regular meeting. You can follow the budget process by visiting our dedicated [Budget webpage](#).

Department of the Month Spotlight Board of Health



The [Westford Board of Health](#) is composed of five elected members who each serve three-year terms. The Board plays a vital role in safeguarding public health by setting local health regulations, overseeing preventative programs, and enforcing state health, sanitary, and environmental codes.

Holiday Cooking Safety Tips

The Board of Health offers holiday cooking safety tips based on guidance from the CDC, FoodSafety.gov, and the National Fire Protection Association (NFPA):

- Don't leave cooking food unattended.
- Keep kids and pets clear of hot surfaces.
- Prevent cross-contamination by separating raw meats and produce.
- Use a food thermometer; turkey should reach 165°F.
- Thaw safely in the refrigerator, not on the counter.
- Refrigerate leftovers within two hours and reheat to 165°F.



Fall Flu Clinics

A big thank you to the Upper Merrimack Valley Medical Reserve Corps (MRC) volunteers and to our Westford Public Health Nurse, Gail Johnson for a successful flu clinic season! Thanks to their hard work and dedication, more than 700 residents and employees received their flu vaccinations this year. We appreciate their commitment to keeping our community healthy and prepared.

Westford Health Offering FREE Narcan Kits & Fentanyl Test Strips Community members can now access overdose prevention tools and training at no cost.

The Westford Health Department is offering free Narcan kits, overdose response training, and free fentanyl test strips to help keep our community safe. No personal information is required to pick up supplies and residents are welcome to pick up resources for themselves or for someone they care about. Residents can visit the Health Department at 55 Main St. to pick up Narcan, which is a simple and effective medication that can reverse an opioid overdose within minutes and is safe to use even if someone is not overdosing.

November 18, 2025 - Select Board Meeting Highlights:

The Select Board recognized local accomplishments, including Senior Center billiards champions and a state cross-country title, and heard resident input on residential tax exemptions and the Pay-As-You-Throw survey. All Consent Agenda items were approved. The Board approved three National Grid pole installation requests and continued one to December 9. They endorsed the Order of Taking for the West Street/North Main Street pedestrian project and set the FY26 single tax rate at \$13.11. Updates were provided by Rep. Arciero and Sen. Cronin, and the FY27 Budget Policy was adopted. The Board supported new alcohol licensing conversion procedures, executed the DiDonato Drive deed, advanced a citizens' petition for an alcohol license, appointed a ZBA alternate, and approved several major contracts, MOUs, and purchases.

November 25, 2025 - Select Board Meeting Highlights:

The meeting opened with announcements, including congratulations to Westford Fire Lt. Andrew Anderson on his retirement, upcoming holiday office closures, and reminders about the Town Common tree lighting and an Accessibility Social event. The Board approved several items, including a luminary event on the Town Common, a liquor license transfer to Liquor Junction, a Common Victualler's License for Pera Grill, and all 2026 liquor license renewals. In a joint session with the School Committee, members voted to restructure the Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion Committee and appointed new full and alternate members. Both boards also approved a Power Purchase Agreement with Ameresco for solar installations at Blanchard Middle School. The Board voted to accept notice from the Westford Land Preservation Foundation that they intend to transfer the conservation restriction at the Stony Brook Conservation Land property to Sudbury Valley Trustees and voted to accept the transfer. They also heard a presentation on Pay-As-You-Throw and voted to move forward with a free 35-gallon cart with pay for overflow bags starting in July 2026. They approved a new Cultural Council seat, an extension of the WCAT MOU, the 2026 Select Board meeting calendar, the MBTA Communities compliance submission, and acceptance of grants and settlement payments.



We would like to thank residents for supporting the purchase of two new fire engines at October's Special Town Meeting. One engine will be purchased as an in-stock unit to replace a reserve engine recently decommissioned due to mechanical failures. Maintaining reliable reserve apparatus is essential to keeping our 24/7 operations running when frontline engines are out for maintenance. Because of the long build time for new apparatus, ordering the second engine now keeps us on schedule for replacing Engine 4 in Nabnasset. With an expected 1,500-day build time, this truck will be ready for service sometime in 2030. Your continued trust and support make our work possible, and we are truly grateful.



On Oct. 20, firefighters responded to a residence on Forge Village Road for a reported house fire. Despite being initially shorthanded due to other emergency calls, Westford Firefighters, assisted by our mutual aid partners, quickly extinguished a basement fire. No residents were injured, and one cat was safely rescued. We would like to remind everyone of the importance of having working smoke alarms in your home. Please test them monthly, change the batteries every six months, and replace older alarms according to manufacturer guidelines to help keep you and your family safe.

Westford, in partnership with the Northern Middlesex Council of Governments (NMCOG), is updating its Open Space and Recreation Plan (OSRP), a state-required document that helps guide investments in parks, trails, conservation areas, and recreation facilities.

To ensure residents' voices shape the Town's priorities, **Westford will host a public visioning session on Monday, December 15, 2025, from 5:30–7:30 p.m., at Westford Fire Station, 65 Boston Road.**

All community members are encouraged to attend including families, seniors, new residents, trail users, youth sports participants, and anyone interested in Westford's natural and recreational resources. Participants will share ideas on open space protection, accessibility, recreation programming, climate resilience, facility needs, and long-term community goals. Feedback from this session will directly inform the draft plan submitted to the state in 2026. A state-approved OSRP makes the Town eligible for state land protection and park improvement grants, helping Westford invest in local priorities.

Major Watermain Break on Grove Street - November 3, 2025

On Nov. 3, a major water main break on Grove St. caused service disruptions and localized flooding when an aging AC pipe failed. DPW Water and Highway crews responded within minutes, supported by Police and Fire for traffic control and safety. Crews quickly isolated the break, closed valves, and temporarily shut down the affected section of roadway to assess damage.

The break impacted multiple utilities, prompting immediate assistance from National Grid, which shut down gas and electric services, stabilized an undermined utility pole, and helped restore power. Keith Carroll Excavating assisted with removing damaged pavement so Town crews could access and replace the failed pipe. Surrounding infrastructure was inspected, and water service was restored to affected homes by early evening, with temporary discoloration resolving after residents flushed their lines. Gas service was restored shortly thereafter, & Grove St. reopened that night to residents and emergency vehicles.

Over the next two weeks, DPW crews, supported by Newport Construction, rebuilt roughly 200 ft. of roadway, with final paving completed on Nov. 21. This event underscores the challenges of aging infrastructure. The DPW continues to evaluate and prioritize vulnerable pipes for future replacement.

Westford Breaks Ground on New PFAS Treatment Facilities!

The Westford Water Dept. has begun construction on two PFAS treatment facilities. A groundbreaking ceremony was held on Friday, Nov. 11, marking an important step in strengthening the protection of Westford's drinking water.

PFAS, often referred to as "forever chemicals," are synthetic compounds used in certain fire-fighting foams, consumer products, and industrial processes. They persist in the environment and have been linked to negative health effects. The new treatment plants will be located next to the existing facilities and will use granular activated carbon (GAC) filtration to remove PFAS from the water supply. Both facilities are expected to be in operation by June 2027.

The total project cost is \$24.5 million, supported by \$23 million in interest-free State Revolving Fund (SRF) loans. Tighe & Bond is serving as the engineering consultant, and RH White is the general contractor.

The ceremony was hosted by Jennifer Pederson, Executive Director of the Massachusetts Water Works Association, and included remarks from Town Manager Kristen Las and State Representative James Arciero.

Holiday Recycling Reminders:

The holiday season generates a large amount of recyclable material, and Westford reminds residents to recycle properly, as Massachusetts bans recyclables from the trash. The Westford Recycling Commission asks residents to recycle all they can.

Acceptable items include flattened cardboard up to 3x3 feet (such as gift, shipping, and food boxes), as well as paper bags, envelopes, newspapers, catalogs, and non-metallic greeting cards. Glass bottles and jars, aluminum and steel cans, and clean plastic containers (bottles, jugs, tubs, and clamshells) are also recyclable. Clean aluminum foil and lightly greasy pizza boxes are allowed.

Items not accepted in recycling bins include plastic bags, Styrofoam, loose caps, shredded paper, milk or juice cartons, black plastic containers, paper towels, napkins, and plates.

Residents can drop off Styrofoam (.25 per pound) and 'retired' Christmas tree lights at Northeast Material Handling, located at 9 Tinkham Ave., Derry, NH. Hours of operation: M-F from 8 a.m. - 3:30pm. Residents are encouraged to call ahead at 978-772-4545.

Place mixed recyclables at the curb by 7 a.m. on your recycling day, separate from trash. There will be no collection on December 25, 2025, or January 1, 2026; affected pickups are delayed one day.





Commission Advances Accessibility Guidance & Hosts December Youth Social

Improving Access in Westford

The Commission voted unanimously to recommend that the Town of Westford adopt the Accessibility Audit of Town Buildings and Properties in Use as a guiding document for future planning at its November meeting. This comprehensive audit, completed by Direct Access with oversight from Assistant Town Manager Mike Edwards and Facilities Director Joe Prochillo, outlines priority improvements needed across municipal buildings and outdoor spaces.

Adoption of this audit as guidance will help the Town more effectively plan for capital improvements, strengthen ADA compliance, and identify potential state and federal grant opportunities. The Commission views this as a meaningful step toward improving access for residents with mobility, sensory, cognitive, and other accessibility needs.

Many also celebrate Our Lady of Guadalupe, Las Posadas, or HumanLight, and observe Winter Solstice and Yule as reminders of renewal and light returning.

This month also includes meaningful global observances that speak to Westford's shared values — World AIDS Day (Dec 1), International Day of Persons with Disabilities (Dec 3), and Human Rights Day (Dec 10).

As the year draws to a close, may we carry forward the spirit of compassion, inclusion, and respect that unites our diverse community. Together, we celebrate the many lights that make Westford shine brighter for all.
